# **HEALTH & SAFETY**

### Safe collection of needles from injected medications and other drugs

United Way partners with ShipHappens and the Peru Police Department to educate our community about safe disposal of sharps used in administration of medications (such as insulin) and other drugs.

Because of your support, we have:

- Decreased improper disposal of sharps by 50%
- Decreased accidental needle pricks and eliminated OSHAreported pricks among police and other local personnel
- Decreased stigma associated with syringe use

#### **Reduction in opioid overdoses**

In 2022, United Way of Miami County and ShipHappens distributed 529 Naloxone kits to residents living in Miami County. These kits help reverse the acute effects of opioid overdose, which are life threatening. Local residents reported that 97 lives were saved as a result of kit distribution.

Opioids include heroin, morphine, codeine, percocet, methadone, fentanyl, and carfentanil. If you suspect someone is experiencing a drug overdose, call 911 and administer Naloxone, even if the drug consumed is unknown.

# **IMPACT PROGRAMS**

Our Community Impact Committee oversees and implements the fund distribution process, ensuring that United Way of Miami County and its community impact partners direct their resources toward the community's greatest needs and are accountable to one another. The Committee reviews all funding requests, assesses program results, and ensures that all programs funded fall within our United Way's strategic priorities.

#### **Housing and Homelessness Initiatives**

- Survival Backpacks and resource referrals for those experiencing homelessness
- PLARN mats for individuals sleeping on the ground
- Family Service Association of Howard County: 45-Day Crisis Shelter and Rapid Rehousing for individuals escaping domestic violence

#### **Health and Safety Initiatives**

- Area Five on Aging: access to healthcare insurance through the Covering Kids and Families program, including application assistance and outreach
- ShipHappens: Prevent Pricks sharps drop off kiosks, community education and prevention of opioid overdose via distribution of Naloxone kits, other prevention

#### **Mental Health Initiatives**

- Family Service Association of Howard County: counseling, support groups, and case management for individuals escaping or surviving domestic violence
- Mental Health America: mental health support groups, behavioral health navigators, crisis hot-lines (text, call center), crisis training for first responders, workplace culture and mental health training
- Miami County YMCA: resiliency-building programs and services


